As we move into spring, it would be easy to set aside or neglect the lessons and rituals of Lent and Easter. After all, we crave warmer weather, the chance to garden, take a walk, or get outside. Family barbeques are just around the corner, and soon school will be winding down and vacations will highlight our summer months. It's not that resurrection doesn't matter, but it may simply not be on our minds as much in the ordinary routines of our daily life.

When you receive this mailing, we will be close to Holy Week, remembering of the story of Jesus' last week before he is crucified, buried, and raised to new life. Many in the church are well acquainted with these stories that we hear each year. They're familiar to us as well because many of us have lived through deep pain, wounds, a world turned upside down, the

death of a loved one, the death of a relationship, or other difficult moments. Recent and ongoing tragedies in the world are also on our mind this Lent and Easter as we immerse ourselves in Jesus' story. However, hearing and knowing the story is different than living it. Although we believe that Jesus was raised from the dead, we may wonder if resurrection exists for us. With that, we may wonder if there is hope for the world. The evidence for new life seems underwhelmed by the evidence of conflict, school shootings, broken dreams, unpredictable events, and distressing circumstances. Our "knowledge" of things as they are, so often, takes precedence over our imagination and hope for the future.

Yet, as Thomas Merton has suggested, resurrection is not simply a one-time act or only for Jesus. No, it is something that lives and grows within us. Resurrection means the possibility of a "true encounter" with Christ that can change our lives or inspire us to a "different life" which more closely imitates the life of Jesus. Hopefully, this is what we all wish for - a faith that leads toward a greater longing for God, a passionate desire to serve, a chance for growth, and a yearning for transformed lives with a deeper, long-lasting hope.

But such a life takes work, preparation, and letting go (or dying to self). Studying scripture, prayer, devotional reading, worship, forgiveness, helping out with the Bean Bag Project or the Keystone Opportunity Center, nurturing God's creation, visiting a friend or someone in need, and many other acts of faith are ways of tilling the soil of our soul. These are just some of the ways we can discover Christ's presence, discern God's will, and practice resurrection.

So, as we welcome the hustle and bustle of activity that enlivens the spring and summer months, may we also welcome a daily encounter with Jesus so our lives can be renewed and transformed. And may we pray that our lives impact others who are also looking for hope, healing, and transformation.



Healthy Moment

Healthy Moment Why is the Room Spinning? By Kristie Lowery, Faith Congregational Nurse

⁶ "'Nevertheless, I will bring health and healing to it; I will heal my people and will let them enjoy abundant peace and security." Jeremiah 33:6

If you enjoy going to amusement parks, you have probably at some time been on the Scrambler or Tilt a Whirl rides. These rides spin and jerk you around very fast, causing one to feel lightheaded and dizzy. And if you are riding it soon after you have consumed food or drink, you may be spilling the beans before the ride is over. There are times that people may experience the same thing just by moving their head. There is a condition called Benian Paroxysmal Positional Vertigo, aka BPPV. Folks experiencing this, have vertigo, lightheadedness, as well as nausea and vomiting with sudden movement of the head.

In an article written by Megan Quandt for Sanford Health, she describes the anatomy of the ear as a branch that houses hearing and an off branch that houses balance. Within the balance branch, there are tiny crystals in a gelatin area. The crystals are supposed to remain in the gelatin area. This balance system in the ear is very delicate and the vestibular or sensory system is finely tuned. Any disruption to the system can initiate a disruption in the balance system.

BPPV is a disruption of the tiny crystals within the inner ear. The crystals help us to know where our head is at in space. When they become dislodged, the crystals float around in the fluid area of the balance branch of the inner ear. This can cause one to feel off balance. The loose crystals cause the spinning and the feeling that the room is spinning. Once the crystals have become loose, the person is more susceptible to experiencing it again. The gelatin is home to all the crystals so if one experiences one episode of dizziness, there is a greater risk for further episodes. BPPV is characterized by sudden bursts of vertigo that are caused by head movements, such as sitting up or tilting the head.

Those that are age 60 or older are more prone to having the crystals dislodge. It can also occur with athletes or those with head trauma injuries. It has been noted that it can occur more often in women experiencing menopause.

Dizziness can be caused by many things, but there is a good possibility that it is caused by BPPV in older adults. When there are loose crystals, any movement can cause dizziness. The dizziness will subside within 30 seconds of initially having it, but it may come back with movement. When the crystals are in place, there are no symptoms. When dislodged, the crystal is floating in the water and causing ripples, just like throwing a rock into a pond of water. When this is happening, one may experience nausea and vomiting. Other symptoms include eyes ticking (rapid back and forth motion) and feeling like the room is spinning. There can also be a feeling of lingering fatigue, queasiness, or imbalance. Once you have developed BPPV, the bursts of dizziness typically occur after a change in the position of the head, such as rolling over in bed.

Treatment involves a visit with an ear, nose, and throat specialist. Once the diagnosis is made and the affected ear is determined,

therapy and some home exercises are done to help the crystals to fall back to where they belong in the ear canal. The exercises can be done at home, and sometimes several times per day until the symptoms subside. Medication is not a source of treatment for BPPV.

Although dizziness due to loose crystal in the ear canal can be problematic, it is a treatable issue. When dealing with the symptoms, see your physician. The sooner it is diagnosed, the more quickly you can get relief of the symptoms.

CHURCH WORLD SERVICE EMERGENCY CLEANUP BUCKETS

Church World Service Emergency Cleanup Buckets

Church World Service has a nearly constant need to have their warehouse supply of Emergency Cleanup Buckets replenished. Now, as there always is with natural disasters, their need is at its greatest. The California flooding and heavy rains and storms in the Midwest have resulted in many families needing even the most basic equipment and supplies to move toward recovery.

CWS ships tens of thousands of kits, blankets, and buckets throughout the year to flood and disaster survivors to help families and communities get on with their lives.

Starting in February and running thru the Lenten season, Zwingli will be helping with the effort to replenish Church World Services inventory of Emergency Cleanup Buckets.

You and/or your family can join us in this project in several ways:

1. Go find a new or clean bucket with a sealable lid (A few buckets are available on the CWS Emergency Cleanup Bucket display table in the atrium.) and fill it with the items listed below. It's a lot like a Treasure Hunt!

You will need to find exact sizes and quantities, please or we can't get the lid on!

- 2. Purchase items that can be used toward making a completed bucket. There will be a "Here's what we still need" Chart also located on the bucket display table.
- 3. Make a donation marked "CWS Buckets". Envelopes can be found in the sanctuary card racks and in the atrium on the Missioners table.

Here's what you'll need:

Please follow the descriptions as accurately as possible!

- One five-gallon bucket with resealable lid (If reused, please scrub clean. Do not use a bucket that has held chemicals of any kind. No screw lid. Advertisement on the outside acceptable).
- NEW One 4-8oz. pump spray air freshener
- Five scouring pads (No stainless steel or pads with soap in them. Remove from packaging.)
- Seven sponges, including one large.
- One scrub brush (With or without handle.)
- 18 reusable, lightweight multipurpose dry-cleaning towels (No terrycloth, microfiber or paper towels. Remove from packaging.)
- One 32-64oz. or two 25oz. bottle(s) of liquid laundry detergent

- One 16-34oz. bottle of liquid disinfectant dish soap
- One 12-40oz. bottle of liquid concentrate household cleaner that can be mixed with water (No spray bottles.)
- One package of 36-50 clothespins
- One 50-100ft. clothesline (Cotton or plastic line.)
- Five dust masks (N95 particulate respirator dust masks preferred; No surgical masks.)
- Two pairs of heavy-duty, waterproof dishwashing gloves (Latex-free, non-surgical. Durable for multiple-use.
 Remove from packaging.)
- One pair of work gloves (Cotton with leather palm or all leather.)
- 20-28 heavy duty or contractor type 30-45 gallon trash bags on a roll. (Remove from packaging.)
- One 6-9oz. bottle of non-aerosol insect repellent (Pump spay bottles must have protective covers. Packs of 10-20 insect repellent wipes also acceptable.)

Keystone Opportunity Center (KOC) is currently working with a mom, dad and their four children, ages 3 to 11, who are living in "Crisis Mode". While KOC is providing all the support they can, this family's needs are greater than they can meet. KOC is asking their community partners, like Zwingli, for support in meeting the needs of this family and helping them find stability. Some background:

In May of 2022, the parents made the difficult decision to seek a better life for their family and, with their four kids, **walked** over 2,200 miles in search of opportunities. This epic trek led them to an emergency shelter that provided a roof over their heads for three months. An opportunity for employment for the dad presented itself in Souderton and they continued their journey to our community.

The family has temporary housing, the kids have started school locally, and they have connected with KOC for food assistance, educational opportunities, and community case management. Last week they found a rental that looked promising but the landlord wanted \$4500 for a security deposit.

While the job opportunity that brought them to our community offers some stability, it is not meeting their needs. The family and KOC, along with their community partners, are seeking a long-term solution. In addition to stable housing, the family is in need of clothing, household items, and other things to help them create a home.




ONA COVENANT
