First off, we will be involved in several pride month activities. Souderton Pride Picnic will happen on the Zwingli grounds from 2-6 PM on Sunday June 11. Not only are we hosting, but we will have an information table at the picnic. Zwingli UCC will also be present at Perkasie Pride on June 24 from 9 -12. Come on out to both pride festivals and see us! Also, we are collecting "Period Packs" to be collected at Synod for distribution across the country. This highlights the real needs of those facing period poverty, who don't have the necessary means for feminine hygiene products. Please see additional information on page 25.




STILL GOING STRONG

Healthy Moment Don't Fry Day By Kristie Lowery – Faith Congregational Nurse

Look at the fig tree and all the trees. When they sprout leaves, you can see for yourselves and know that summer is near. Even so, when you see these things happening you know that the kingdom of God is near. Luke 21: 29-31

It is finally here — spring has arrived and summer is not far behind! Most people are ready for summer and all the fun that is associated with nice warm summer days. Gardening, hiking, camping, amusement parks, fishing, and biking are just a few of the things that we look forward to doing during the days of summer. However, with the summer fun comes some concerns about our skin and the exposure to the sun.

The National Council on Skin Cancer Prevention has designated the Friday before Memorial Day as "Don't Fry Day" to encourage everyone to be sun safe as they enjoy the outdoors as they kick off the summer season. The goal of Don't Fry Day is to raise awareness about sun safety and skin cancer prevention.

Skin cancer is the most common cancer in the United States and 90% of skin cancers are preventable, yet incidence rates continue to rise. Risk factors for skin cancer include the following: history of sun exposure or indoor tanning, having light-colored skin, getting older, having a personal history of sunburns, having a personal or

family history of skin cancer, and having a weakened or suppressed immune system.

Take small steps today and every day to protect your skin and prevent skin cancer. Never intentionally tan (either from artificial or natural light), cover up and seek shade when outdoors, and wear and reapply sunscreen. The National Council on Skin Cancer Prevention is also taking a community responsibility approach to sun protection this year. They are encouraging all members of the community to be an advocate for practicing sun safe behaviors. In all the roles that one may fill, whether as a family member, friend, educator or leader, the National Council on Skin Cancer Prevention encourages us to practice one, two or many of these sun safety practices to protect our skin from the sun's rays.

Preventive precautions to help prevent skin cancer:

- Wear protective clothing in the sun; wear a hat that shades the face, neck and ears; and plan outdoor activities around the midday.
- Examine the skin regularly. Suspicious lesions or progressive changes in a lesion's appearance or size should be evaluated promptly by a physician.
- Wear sunglasses to protect eyes from UV light.
- Use a sunscreen with a broad-spectrum sun protection factor (SPF) of 30 or higher and apply a generous amount (about a palmful) to all exposed skin 15-20 minutes before going outdoors. Reapply sunscreen every two hours throughout the day, especially after swimming, sweating, or towel drying. Use sunscreen even on hazy days.
- Avoid artificial sources of UV light (sunlamps, tanning beds)

An easy way to remember these important sun safety tips is: *Slip, Slop, Slap and Wrap.*

- Slip on a shirt
- Slop on broad spectrum sunscreen (SPF 30 or higher)
- Slap on a hat
- Wrap on some sunglasses

JUNETEENTH

Join us Sunday, June 18 as we honor Juneteenth. We will have a Juneteenth display in the atrium and serve special refreshments.

June 19th is not the day the Emancipation Proclamation was signed. It is the day in 1865 when enslaved people in Galveston, Texas finally learned that the United States had abolished slavery. A more than two-year delay that compounded centuries of bondage with tragedy.

Although Juneteenth has been celebrated in African American communities for generations, it became a federal holiday for the first time last year. In June 2021, with the bipartisan support of Congress, President Joe Biden established Juneteenth as federal holiday. At the time, the President said:

"Great nations don't ignore their most painful moments. They don't ignore those moments of the past. They embrace them. Great nations don't walk away. We come to terms with the mistakes we made. And in remembering those moments, we begin to heal and grow stronger."

"The truth is, it's not — simply not enough just to commemorate Juneteenth. After all, the emancipation of enslaved Black

Americans didn't mark the end of America's work to deliver on the promise of equality; it only marked the beginning. "To honor the true meaning of Juneteenth, we have to continue toward that promise because we've not gotten there yet." Juneteenth is a reminder that freedom, justice, and equal rights cannot be taken for granted. These ideals must be cherished and ever renewed. These ideals must be embodied in practice every day and defended.

Juneteenth is also a celebration of the miraculous perseverance and resilience of the descendants of the enslaved. It is a marker of a special relationship to the ideal of liberty shared by any and all of us who come from communities that have been persecuted, dispossessed, or held in bondage.

As we reflect on Juneteenth's meaning and lessons for this day, we must recommit to the legacy of emancipation, to the protection of civil rights, and to the fulfilment of liberty and justice for all.

PRIDE MONTH!

The month of June is Pride Month. This month is celebrated as a tribute to those who were involved in the Stonewall Riots which was a series of gay liberation protests in 1969.

Why is Pride Month so celebrated?

Pride Month was initially inspired by the 1969 Stonewall Uprising and works to achieve equal justice and opportunity for LGBTQ+ Americans. The purpose of the month is to recognize the impact that LGBTQ+ individuals have had on society locally, nationally and internationally.

What does Pride stand for?

The word 'pride' is an integral cultural concept within the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, Intersex (LGBTQI) community, representing solidarity, collectivity, and identity as well as resistance to discrimination and violence.

Why is Pride Day called Pride?

"Pride" is the designated name or slogan that commemorates the anniversary of the Stonewall Inn Riots. It started in 1970, a year after the Stonewall Inn Riots took place, as a peaceful march with no dress restrictions where people could express themselves and their sexuality freely.

SPECIAL SERVICE PROJECT FOR GENERAL SYNOD 34

Menstruation is a normal, healthy bodily function for half the world's population. But not everyone who gets a period can afford the hygiene products.

Period poverty affects many in the United States and worldwide who cannot afford menstrual hygiene products.

The United Church of Christ is planning to create menstrual hygiene kits or "period packs" as a <u>General Synod 34</u> service project.

Last fall, <u>Church World Service added period packs</u> to its lineup of emergency service kits. The UCC is partnering with <u>CWS</u> on this Synod mission project. The gathering in Indianapolis, June 30-July 4, provides a larger way to address menstrual justice as the wider church.

The UCC and CWS hopes to collect and assemble kits at General Synod at the Indiana Convention Center, with a goal of amassing 1,000 period packs by July 4. The Synod attendees are invited to bring assembled kits or hygiene items to donate to the service project.

A hygiene kit checklist is in the reverse of this sheet.

Please bring any donated supplies or completed kits to the church by June 25. Pastor Alan is a delegate to the General Synod and will deliver our gifts.

Bulk supplies or completed kits are welcome.

**SUPPLIES NEEDED FOR EACH KIT:

- One 1-gallon Ziploc bag
- Two 2 oz bottle hand sanitizer
- Three 4-gallon bathroom trash bags
- One travel pack of Wet Ones
- Ten unscented tampons
 - o (5 regular, 5 super absorbency)
- Ten unscented sanitary napkins
 - (Long super ultra-thin)
- One bath-size bar of soap in the original package
 - (3 oz bar or larger. NO Ivory or Jergen's soap)
- One pack of flushable wipes
 - (Unscented 42 count)
- Six laundry detergent sheets
 - (Place sheets in small Ziploc bag)

COMPLETE KIT ASSEMBLY TIPS:

Place all items in the plastic bag, remove air, and seal.

All items must be new.

Do not enclose personal notes, money, or extra items in the kits.


